LANGUAGE ARTS:


- Students will understand that stories, both fiction and nonfiction, follow a structure: beginning, problem, solution, and ending.
- Students will actively contribute to discussions as both listeners and speakers.
- Students will listen to and follow three-step instructions.
- Students will develop their listening and speaking skills to improve oral communication.
- Students will use the connection strategy to enhance their writing activities.
- Students will use punctuation and capitalization accurately in their writing.
- Students will develop spelling skills. MATH:
- Students will represent numbers up to 1,000 in different forms, including place value, numerals, written form, and expanded forms. Students will skip count by 2s, 10s, 20s, 25s, 50s, and 100s up to 1,000.
- Students will understand the concept of even and odd numbers up to 1,000.

SOCIAL STUDIES:

- Students will explore the dynamic relationship between people, places, aces and time.
- Students will understand how perspectives and events shape our understanding of the world.
- Students will learn that heritage consists of culture and traditions passed down through generations

SCIENCE:

- Students will learn about the properties of materials, such as whether they allow light to pass through (transparency), absorb water, can be shaped (malleability), or reflect light (reflection).
- Students will understand that natural materials come from plants, animals, the land, or the sky.
- Students will recognize that processed materials are man-made.
